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
## 2015 ZIMELE EXCHANGE



Kenya Buffaloes (BBCEC) and Tanzanian Simbas (ERSSS)

The second Zimele Foundation sponsored exchange was hosted last week by Edmund Rice Sinon Secondary School who welcomed a group of seventy students and staff from Brother Beausang who made the trip to Arusha on Sunday July 5.

After a long wait at Namanga to finalize travel and health regulations, the excitement went up a notch as the reality of being in Tanzania hit home. This excitement became even more intense when the buses reached the outskirts of Arusha and even another delay (as the bus crew decided to off load some additional goods and a few 'dodgy' - Australian expression for suspicious looking - passengers that somehow found their way on board) could not dampen the enthusiasm and soon we were heading down through Unga Limited to ERSSS.

After a warm welcome from Br. Clem and an enjoyable supper and soda the BBCEC group headed for their accommodation in the dormitories – a new experience for most being lifelong day students. The Zimele group led by Tom Purcell had also arrived so it was also good to see some familiar faces.

Although tired many of the students woke up early to make sure they did not miss out on any action including early morning basketball and discussions! Breakfast was most welcome and then Br. Clem gave the group a short introduction





about the school followed by a tour. The garden and library areas were particularly impressive. After this we made the short walk to FoodWaterShelter (FWS), (Kesho Leo) before returning to Sinon for lunch.

The afternoon saw the formal program of competition begin with the girls volleyball having the honour of getting things underway. Beausang drew first blood with a hard fought victory but Sinon were also soon celebrating as their boys volleyball had a convincing win over the Beausang team. Both matches served only to whet the appetite for further contests and after supper no one was disappointed by a very fierce debate that saw national pride for both sets of students put to the test but in the end the team from Embulbul emerged the winner. The pulse rates were now high but a good sleep (and another early morning wake up by some students) meant all were ready for day two action.



Inspired by the debate, the basketballers gave everything and in a physical content the BBCEC Rockets edged out the host team. Next on the court were the netball girls and the Beausang Diamonds, the 2014 - 2015 Kajiado Champions showed their class with a clear win in spite of not being familiar with some of the rule interpretations operating in Tanzania.

Lunch provided a welcome break before all made the twenty five minute bus trip to the field near Arusha airport for the Australian Rules match between the Kenyan Buffaloes and Tanzanian Simbas. With the home crowd support boosted by Christian Brother postulants from nearby Shams led by Br. Gerard Ellul , all was set for another epic battle similar to 2014. Hamish from the Zimele group was interim coach of the Buffaloes in the absence of the Principal who was left in Embulbul on other duties! Br. Clem was the man with the clipboard for the Simbas.

The match did not fail to live up to expectations and in a low scoring and bruising encounter played in rain, wind and sunshine, the Buffaloes were able to keep narrowly in front for most of the match until the Simbas looked to take a leaf out of the 2014 Buffalo match plan and come from behind at the end to snatch victory with a goal late in the final quarter that put them in front.





To prove that history does repeat, Emmanuel Mutisya who kicked the game winning point on the bell in 2014 did it again, kicking the decisive goal with a few minutes to play allowing BBCEC to sneak a 4 point win. Tom Purcell who also umpired the game made the following comments:

Following presentations at the field and formal concluding words and then supper back at the school, all the students enjoyed an entertaining post competition social

evening that saw the dancing styles of the Tanzanian and Kenyan students do their countries proud!

On Wednesday morning the journey back home began with parting words from Br. Clem but once we reached Arusha town the bus people decided to change the arrangements made when the booking was finalized, thus delaying the trip for a few hours which allowed the students the opportunity to compare Nakumatt Arusha to Nakumatt Karen or in most cases with Sweet World Supermarket Embulbul and to debate the differences between a matatu and a daladala.

Once underway the trip was reasonably straight forward although the Journalism Club Captain travelled in pain having sustained a hairline fracture of the wrist playing basketball in the dark at 5.30 a.m. that morning! The tired but happy party arrived back at school shortly after 6 p.m. No surprises then that not all made it to school on Thursday and those that did soon succumbed to exhaustion and were given leave to head home by the ever caring Principal.

Our thanks must go to Tom Purcell and Zimele for their sponsorship and to Br. Clem, the students and staff of Edmund Rice Sinon who made this such a memorable experience for all involved. Asante Sana! This was a special opportunity and we are very fortunate to have such generous supporters such as Tom and Zimele.
