Saturday & Sunday December 12 & 13 were days when Julian McDonald led the assembled Brothers of the East Africa District through a reflection on the some of the implications of the 8 calls of the Nairobi chapter. Saturday was a very challenging day for me. Following directions to form groups of three with Brothers we did not know too well, providence led me to be with two Kenyan Brothers.

Part 1 was the telling of our personal / vocational stories, which, even after more than ten years in Kenya, I again found fascinating. The call to be disciples of Jesus cuts through though cultural nuances of different ethnic groups. Being Brother in a church where Brotherhood is barely known, or at best, almost despised, is an almighty step in the dark.

Part 2 was a huge challenge to me. We were asked to tell our sexual stories. What!! I thought, me at 75, share with Brothers on their 20's/30's, Brothers who, in their initial formation, had done so many times. In my 1950's/60's formation, right up to final vows and beyond, sex was a taboo topic. The only 'safe' place for me was on courses where there were no CB's. I was liberated by the two Brothers listening to me, setting the ground for communities to respond to the Chapter call to greater intimacy.

She had come to BBCEC to find possible ways institutions could connect with one another and extend the work of Project Kenya Beyond Charity.

She also compiled footage comparing "A day in the life of a student" at each of the two schools. Most of the Brother Beausang staff will remember her for her words: "The one who works hardest gains most", in reference to increasing student engagement and class-participation.
