STUDENT FEEDBACK

There is a body of compelling theory and research that shows hearing 'how well we've done' from someone in a position of power does not lead us to improve: Researchers Ruth Butler, Emily R Fyfe, Bethany Rittle-Johnson, at Duke University in 2020, Lorrie Shepard at U of Colorado.

"Feedback" originally referred to a self-regulating system like a thermostat in which output affects input...When the word is applied to human communication, it should refer only to information: "Here's something you did that I noticed...." When feedback is contaminated: evaluation ("Here's what I think about what you did. ...") it tends to become not only less effective but ...damaging to future performance.

First, in Canto Grande, we met Carmen and her family, who make clothing. Her



husband designs and creates the patterns, and Carmen and her two sons cut and sew the pieces together.

Next, we visited Tania, who makes bracelets with beads and thread and sells them. She also cuts fabric into squares. At her house, we cut cloth and

shared stories and experiences.

The next day, we made our way to Jicamarca. Jicamarca is northeast of San Juan Lurigancho, and to get there, we rode the bus to the end of the line and into the hills. As we traveled further north and east, the structures became less permanent. We moved from concrete and brick to pressboard homes, or in many cases, houses made of scrap lumber and aluminum.



We met Señora Nelda, her husband Jose, and their two children. Señora Nelda is frail and has cancer. She needs surgery, but their family does not have the money to pay the doctors. So, the two children, teenagers, go to school and help their parents. Jose sells fruit in the local market. Then, when he comes home, he helps his wife and neighbors. One bilingual Pilgrim shared her conversation with Jose, "When he was thanking us, he said: 'All I pray for every day is my family, our health and work.' He was so very grateful for his new home but considered it an 'extra.'"

Finally, it is essential to note that Jicamarca does not have a Catholic parish. Jicamarca is too undeveloped, too far away, and too poor. There is no priest to celebrate the Eucharist or any of the sacraments. Yet, despite the lack of a parish, the Church is alive. She lives in the loving actions that support family and community. She is the person who has so little and yet shares. She is the Christian Brothers and other religious communities committed to the poor. She is the Peruvian people who love and work and build a life in the dirt and rocks outside Lima. She is also all of us, teachers, and students, who experience immersion, support the mission's ap-peal and commit to building God's Kingdom. The Church is all of us, walking together.

When we pilgrims join our hearts and hands, the Church is alive and at its best. We are also the face of Blessed Edmund Rice. As one Pilgrim said, quoting Blessed Edmund, "There are so many things that I thought I understood on a cerebral level that I now feel that I understand on a more practical or visceral level." Were we to know the merit and value of only going from one street to another for the love of God, we should prize it more than gold or silver."

CHURCH

Essential Element Number One of an Edmund Rice Christian Brother Education is:

Every three years since the closing of the Second Vatican Council the Church has been holding meetings called, **synods**, composed of Bishops from around the world to discuss certain topics. The topics have been determined before hand and the documents or discussion and critique produced and the results shared with us. Some of the past topics have been: the Church in the Americas, Europe, Asia, Africa, priesthood, and the laity.

During the past year parishes met and 175 of 178 (Arch) Dioceses in the United States sent reports to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. This year there are to be regional and national meetings.

Key themes that have surfaced are: clericalism, role of women, lack of real effort with: youth, "nones," LGBTG+.

In his October 9, 2021 homily, Pope Francis quoted the theologian Yves Conger:

"...we do not need another Church."
We need a *different* Church."
