Have We Got News For You!




The Essential Elements of an Edmund Rice Christian Brother Education state:

- 1. Evangelize Youth within the Mission of the Church
- 2. Proclaim and Witness to Catholic Identity
- 3. Stand in Solidarity with those Marginalized by Poverty and Injustice
- 5 Celebrate the Value and Dignity of Each Person and Nurture the Development of the Whole Person

The Essential Elements are based upon:

Key Themes In Catholic Social Teaching

- Dignity of the Human Person: individuals have access to the basic necessities of life
- Option for the Poor: the moral fabric
- of a nation is determined by how well it provides for the poor in its midst
- Solidarity of the Human Family: We are all part of the earths household no one should be exclude
- The Common Good: Social Structures must allow all to participate
- Participation: all involved in making decisions affecting them
- Dignity of Work: flows from the dignity of the human person
- Universal Purpose of Material Things: nature, natural resources, technology must contribute to the common good and support community.
- Social Nature of the Human Person: We each exist in a community and our welfare is safeguarded by community policies and structures.

Education Week Research Center Survey of 1,019 Educators between September 27 and October 4, 2022.

(32% of participants self-identified as Liberal, 33% self-identified as Moderate, 35% self-Identified as conservative)

1)Do you support or oppose state government restrictions on K-12 teaching, curriculum and/or reading materials containing the following subjects?

- + Slavery: 77% oppose,23% support
- + The Holocaust: 76% oppose, 24% support
- + Ethnicity/race: 74% oppose, 26% support
- + Religion: 73% oppose, 27% support
- + Sex Ed: 69% oppose, 31% support
- Gender/sexual orientation 68%oppose, 32% support

'Swatting' Hoaxes Disrupt Schools Across the Country. What Educators Should Know.

[Swatting: filing a false report with the aim of stoking chaos and provoking a large law enforcement response.]

False reports of school shootings pose real risks.

(90 schools during a three week period in September)

Some Info:

- · Calls are to local police
- Calls claim to be being made from inside the building, sometimes citing specific areas or injured students
- Lockdowns prompt uncertainty and emotional reactions:
 - with adults in the building be as specific as you can be
- Communicate with Families
 - about the reason
 - the nature of the threat
 - what level of precaution to take
- Communicate with the students
 - your lockdown plan
 - how you will determine it is safe to return
 - how you will communicate during emergencies (texts ?)
 - After a lockdown:
 - debrief Faculty and Staff
 - + on what worked and
 - + what needs to be improved
 - · debrief with students
 - how did actual lockdown compare with a drill lockdown
 - + how do they feel ?

Teaching Goldfish To Drive

Israeli Researchers reported in the journal Behavioral Brain Research:

- Goldfish were trained to use a wheeled platform
- the platform could be driven and have its course changed in Reaction to the fish's movements inside a water tank on the platform
- the task was to "drive" toward a target that could be seen through the walls of the fish tank
 - the platform had a remote sensing technology that used lasers
 - that told its location and where the fish was in the tank
 - after being tested to reach the target the fish got food
 - goldfish have the cognitive ability to learn a complex task in an unknown environment . (Washington Post, 01/11/2022)
